Introduction to Financialized Capitalism: What is New?

• "financialization": "increasing importance of financial markets, financial motives, financial institutions, and financial elites in the operation of the economy and its governing institutions, both at the national and international levels" (Epstein, 2005, 3, Financialization in the World Economy).



Outsized Role of Intangibles in Contemporary Capitalism

- Increased Political and Economic Power of Owners of Intangibles and Controllers of Global Value Chains
- Can Dictate Terms of Trade and Investment Agreements to Shore Up their Oligopoly and Oligopsony Power

Multi-Level Governance Effects

- Macro-level: Power shift, Concentration, Oligopoly, Volatility
- Multilateral level: Reduced Commitment to Health Policy in Face of Imperatives of Finance Capitalism (donor dependence; economic powers block health initiatives if threaten profits and shareholder value); Plurilateral and Bilateral Strategies





Multi-level Governance Effects

- Meso-level: Short-termism; Broken link between labor productivity and wage growth; Labor power reduced; "Flexibile" employment; Deregulation; Privatization
- National Level: Tax cuts for the 1%; Tax evasion; Austerity; Reduced public budgets to address health; Sharpening income inequality





Multi-level Governance Effects

 Every-day: Debt; private responsibility for retirement income; payday lenders; fast food consumption; unaffordable medicines and health services; deaths of despair; inequality; poverty
